

Council's fight for Flat Rock Creek

Willoughby City Council is fighting to protect Flat Rock Creek in the wake of last year's devastating pollution incident.

On Monday 5 December 2022, a major fire broke out at the Cleanaway Resource Recovery Centre at Artarmon, which is within the Flat Rock Creek catchment. Soon after, community members reported significant foam plumes and fish kills in the natural areas of the creek in the suburbs

of Naremburn and Northbridge (pictured left).

Following a Council resolution on 12 December 2022, the Council wrote to the

NSW Environment Protection Authority, seeking the outcomes of testing results and urging regulatory action to better manage pollution impacts from the Cleanaway site.

The Council has also resolved to:

- Work on, and seek funding for, new projects that improve water quality in the catchment, including natural wetland and pond areas and additional gross pollutant traps; and
- Continue to raise concerns about the Beaches Link project, in particular the Flat Rock Drive construction site which has the potential to cause damage to the Flat Rock Gully area.

In the catchment, there are currently four gross pollutant traps (which trap waste before it enters the waterway) and 15 bio-filtration devices (gardens on the side of the road which intercept and help filter stormwater). The Council is planning to install a further ten bio-filtration devices in this catchment over 24 months.

CELEBRATING OUR SMALL CRITTERS

Dozens of inspiring and humorous stories, poetry and artwork from Year 5 students have been celebrated in Willoughby City Council's latest Wildlife Storybook, which champions the vital biodiversity role played by small bush creatures.


Around 50 proud students and their parents, grandparents, carers and teachers gathered at Chatswood City Library for the launch of the 12th annual Wildlife Storybook. The Wildlife Storybook is a culmination of a Council-led program

that sees each Willoughby primary school visited by Bushland Education Officers to learn about the local environment and the creatures within it. The students work with their teachers to research a particular animal and share stories with their classmates.

The book celebrates Willoughby as home to many small species including ants, snakes, bats, small birds, bugs, plankton and seahorses. These species, although mostly unseen, play a vital role as essential decomposers, soil aerators, fertilisers, seed storers, transporters and pollinators. A Golden-tailed Spiny Ant artwork by Castle Cove Public School student Olivia (pictured right) was selected for the front cover.

SUMMER FACELIFT FOR NORTHBRIDGE BATHS

Swimmers flocked to the iconic and historic Northbridge Baths over summer to take advantage of upgraded access points and an improved and safer pool walkway.

As part of \$370,000 in works, new rubber softfall material has been installed around the bath's perimeter walkway (pictured above). In addition, new stairs have been constructed from the carpark directly to the grassed area near the baths, while an existing set of stairs from the carpark to Widgiewa Rd have also been upgraded. Slip-resistant rubber tiles have also been placed on stairs leading into the water.

Council has invested \$220,000 into the project, while the NSW

Government provided \$150,000 through its Places to Swim Grant Program.

Further works are planned during autumn, including the installation of permanent ground-cover under the existing shade sail, a new energy efficient smart BBQ and new turf areas.

Often called 'one of the hidden jewels of Willoughby City', the Northbridge Baths opened in 1924 and will next year celebrate 100 years of use.

LEISURE CENTRE WORK UNDERWAY

Construction work is now underway on a \$38.9 million upgrade to create a modern and expanded Willoughby Leisure Centre.

On 8 February, Willoughby Mayor Tanya Taylor, Willoughby MP Tim James and Belmadar Managing Director Alf Marrocco celebrated the commencement of work. Belmadar is a Naremburn-based construction company. The Council is providing just under \$34 million in funds for the works, with the NSW Government providing \$5 million from its Multi-Sport Community Facility Fund. The upgraded centre is due to be completed by mid-2024.



HIGHWAY TRANSFORMED INTO ACTIVE TRANSPORT CORRIDOR

Cyclists and pedestrians can now travel between Chatswood and St Leonards using a safe off-road path, following the opening of the 3.5km Pacific Highway shared path.

The \$5.8 million shared path was built by Willoughby City Council, with the support of \$2.29 million in NSW Government funding from its Precinct Support Scheme.

The shared path is a clever re-purposing of the existing Pacific Highway footpath and road verge into pedestrian and cycling route, including new landscaping and bus shelter relocations. As shown in the map to the right, the path begins at Herbert St, St Leonards and runs to Nelson St, Chatswood. After a short 100m section of on-road travel on Nelson St (a quiet cul-de-sac) pedestrians and cyclists can then use the existing off-road Frank Channon Walk alongside the North Shore train line to travel directly into the Chatswood CBD.

This shared path is in line with the Council's community priority to enhance transport options and connections, including increasing the number of journeys to work which do not use a motor vehicle.

The shared path has been designed to integrate with Willoughby's active transport network, including connections to the Gore Hill Freeway shared and cycling paths, and on-road


cycling routes to the Artarmon industrial area, Artarmon railway station and Naremburn local centre.

A second stage of the Pacific Highway path project, involving the installation of specialist bicycle crossings at signalised intersections along the route, is due for completion by December 2023.

Willoughby City Council is currently planning an additional cycling and pedestrian route between St Leonards and Chatswood, which will be parallel to the North Shore railway line and run through the Artarmon local centre.



MAP: NEW PACIFIC HIGHWAY SHARED PATH




